# THE FIFTH COMMANDMENT

The Fifth Commandment starts the "negative commandments," those that start with 'You shall not...'. Each of these commandments forbids some kind of injury to our neighbor.

In his book *Commandments of Compassion*, Father James Keenan writes: "We only understand the seriousness of the Fifth Commandment when we appreciate the sacred importance of human life. Without respect for human life, we are prone to violate it."

Every human person has an immortal soul, and each person has a certain dignity. The most serious violation against man is to attack his life. Deliberate murder of an innocent is against the natural law of the Creator.

We all know the most serious sins against the Fifth Commandment...abortion, euthanasia, murder, suicide and assisted suicide. Most people don't commit these sins but that does not mean we have not sinned against the Fifth Commandment.

Other sins include: reckless disregard for other people's lives such as when driving under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol; unjust, disordered anger expressed by infringing on the rights of others-this often leads to words spoken that we wish we could take back. All of us have experienced anger. Our choices are to "blow up" and possibly hurt someone, or forgive the person who hurt us in some way, and then let it go. This is, of course, the way to let anger go, just as Jesus taught us in the Lord's Prayer..."Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us."

#### Additional sins against the Fifth Commandment include:

<u>Cult of the Body</u>, which is an obsessive disfigurement or disrespectful mutilation of the body. Examples include: excessive food deprivation, inordinate body piercing and tattooing, extreme body building using steroids, physical sterilization for the purpose of contraception and radical unnecessary plastic surgery;

Gluttony, which consists of eating to excess beyond the amount necessary for proper nutrition;

<u>Substance Abuse</u>, which is always seriously sinful. Abuses of alcohol and drugs frequently lead to serious infractions such as abusive behavior, auto accidents, and other acts of violence;

Omission of service to others is a failure to assist others when we are able to do so. This, then, is a failure to serve Christ;

<u>Racism</u>, a hatred or lack of respect for other persons because of skin color, ethnicity or natural origin, is a sin because it goes against the unconditional love that Jesus has for every person.

### Before going to Confession, ask yourself:

Have I harmed another through physical, verbal or emotional means, including gossip or manipulation of any kind?

Did I neglect my health?

Have I mutilated myself or another?

Did I get drunk, use prohibited drugs, or illicitly use prescription medication?

Did I eat or drink more than the sufficient amount, allowing myself to get carried away through gluttony?

Did I participate in any form of malicious violence?

Did I desire revenge or harbor empty hatred?

Have I expressed any 'bullying' behavior towards another?
